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American Recovery and Reinvestment Act Update

New information regarding the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) is made available on a daily basis. You can monitor the overall progress of the ARRA by visiting www.recovery.gov. The State of California has created its own recovery website (www.recovery.ca.gov) that allows you to track California's progress and obtain additional information about the allocation of funds in our state. In addition, to track ARRA progress in the City and County of San Francisco please visit www.recoverysf.org. Each federal department also has an individual website that further details recovery plans for specific areas. Updates throughout the guide are highlighted in yellow.

Some of the most recent allotments of funds to state and local governments include: the release of the first wave of funding from the Agriculture Department, the implementation of key initiatives to promote lending to small businesses, the release of \$100 million for senior nutrition programs, and the release of \$268 million for hospitals serving uninsured, vulnerable Americans. Another recent announcement included a one-time payment of \$250 to adult Social Security beneficiaries and to SSI recipients. Also, to help middle-class families get back on their feet and restore some fairness to the tax code, the Making Work Pay tax credit provides a refundable tax credit of 6.2 percent of earned income up to \$400 for individuals and \$800 for married taxpayers. As of April 1st, most workers should be seeing an increase in their take-home pay. Families should see at least a \$65 per month increase in their take-home pay.

On April 1st, the Department of Education announced that \$44 billion in Recovery Act funding will be distributed over the next few weeks, \$11.4 billion of which will be released on April 1st. Included in the \$11.4 billion was half of the \$10 billion in Title I grants and half of the \$12 billion in IDEA grants in the Recovery Act. On April 2nd, the Department of Health and Human Services announced that the Head Start and Early Head Start programs will begin receiving funding and be eligible to apply for grants under the \$2.1 billion provided by the Recovery Act. This includes \$1.1 billion to support Early Head Start expansion, funds that will nearly double the number of participants. Head Start will receive \$220 million to serve an additional 16,000 children and \$354 million to provide for quality enhancements including upgrading classrooms, increasing hours of operation, and enhancing transportation services.

CHILD CARE

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Child Care and Development Fund

\$2 billion included for the Child Care and Development Fund

California will receive \$220,273,864. Of the \$220 million, \$18,209,797 will be used to increase child care quality, \$10,545,859 will be used for infant and toddler child care quality, and \$191,518,208 will be used for child care program funding.

Purpose:	<p>The funding for these grants will be distributed to states for quality improvements for infant and toddler care. This additional funding will enable states to provide child care assistance for an additional 300,000 children in low-income working families who have been suffering from the economic downturn, and is estimated that it will generate paid employment for roughly 125,000 caregivers.</p> <p>To support child care services for more families whose children require care while they are working, seeking employment or receiving job training or education. The funds will be used by states to provide vouchers to families for child care or to provide access to care through contracts with child care centers.</p>
Description:	These are federal funds that do not require a state match. Included in the \$2 billion is \$255 million for quality improvement, of which \$93.6 million is targeted for activities to improve the quality of care for infants and toddlers.

Child Tax Credit

Agency:	Internal Revenue Service
Purpose:	A child tax credit is a tax credit based on the number of dependent children in a family under the age of 17 years. This provision would increase the eligibility of the refundable child tax credit.

Description:	Reduces the minimum earned income amount used to calculate the additional child tax credit to \$3,000. Before ARRA, the minimum earned income amount was set to rise to \$12,550. Reducing the amount to \$3,000 permits more taxpayers to use the additional child tax credit and increases the amount of the payments they may receive. The child tax credit cannot exceed \$1,000 for each qualifying child.

Department of Education will award governors approximately \$48.6 billion by formula in exchange for a commitment to advance essential education reforms to benefit students from early learning through post-secondary education, including: college- and career- ready standards and high-quality, valid and reliable assessments for all students; development and use of pre-K through post-secondary and career data systems; increasing teacher effectiveness and ensuring an equitable distribution of qualified teachers; and turning around the lowest-performing schools.</p> <p>The Department will award the remaining \$5 billion competitively under the "Race to the Top" and "Investing in What Works and Innovation" programs.</p>

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Vocational Rehabilitation State Grants

\$540 million included for Vocational Rehabilitation State Grants.

California will receive \$56.4 million in Vocational Rehabilitation State Grants.

Type:	Formula grants
Purpose:	Provides grants to states to support a wide range of services designed to help individuals with disabilities prepare for and engage in gainful employment consistent with their strengths, resources, priorities, concerns, abilities, capabilities, interests, and informed choice. Eligible individuals are those who have a physical or mental impairment that results in a substantial impediment to employment, who can benefit from vocational rehabilitation (VR) services for employment, and who require VR services. Priority must be given to serving individuals with the most significant disabilities if a state is unable to serve all eligible individuals.
Description:	Funds are distributed to states and territories based on a formula that takes into account population and per capita income to cover the cost of direct services and program administration. Grant funds are administered under an approved state plan by VR agencies designated by each state. The state-matching requirement is 21.3 percent; however, the state share is 50 percent for the cost of construction of a facility for community rehabilitation program purposes.

\$140 million included for Independent Living State Grants (only \$52.5 million will be distributed by formula; remaining \$87.5 will be distributed by competitive grants at a later date).

Federal Work-Study

\$200 million included for the Federal Work-Study program.

California will receive \$20.6 million in Federal Work-Study program funding.

Purpose:	To provide funds that are earned through part-time employment to assist students in financing the costs of postsecondary education.
Description:	<p>Students can receive FWS funds at approximately 3,400 participating postsecondary institutions. Institutional financial aid administrators at participating institutions have substantial flexibility in determining the amount of FWS awards to provide to students who are enrolled or accepted for enrollment. Hourly wages must not be less than the federal minimum wage.</p> <p>Financial need is determined by the Department, using a standard formula established by Congress, to evaluate the financial information reported on the FAFSA and to determine the expected family contribution (EFC).</p>

Federal Pell Grant Funding

\$15.64 billion included for the Federal Pell Grant Funding program.

Purpose:	The ARRA increases the maximum Pell Grant for individuals to \$5,350 for the 2009-2010 school year and to \$5,550 for the 2010-2011 school year.
Description:	The Federal Pell Grant Program provides need-based grants to low-income undergraduate and certain post-baccalaureate students to promote access to postsecondary education. The Pell Grant is the largest source of federal grant aid to postsecondary students. Pell Grants are portable, in that the grant aid follows students to the eligible postsecondary education institutions in which they enroll.

The primary target populations for YouthBuild are adjudicated youth, youth aging out of foster care, and out-of-school youth. The YouthBuild program is perfectly aligned with the Interagency Youth Vision and demand-driven investments supported by Workforce Investment Act (WIA) formula funds.
