Shelter Network of San Mateo County (a non-profit corporation) was established in 1987 to address the problem of homelessness on the San Francisco Peninsula. The organization now operates 13 programs located throughout San Mateo County.

Shelter Network provides four types of programs: **short-term emergency and transitional shelter** (immediate housing and services for up to 60 days), **transitional housing** (housing and services for **up** to 6 months, while families search for apartments and jobs), **longer-term transitional housing** (rental assistance and case management for up to 1 year, while individuals complete job training or community college programs), and **permanent supportive housing**, for the chronically homeless. All programs provide shelter and food, as well as comprehensive support services, including one-on-one case management, life skills workshops, a mandatory savings program, health care referrals, job and housing search assistance, and a six month  
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follow-up program. At our programs in Menlo Park and San Mateo, families also receive free on-site child care for toddlers and preschoolers through our licensed Therapeutic Child Development Center Program. All of our family programs offer children's programming including after-school activities, homework club, extracurricular activities, and medical, mental health, and special needs assessments and referrals.

Today, Shelter Network serves over 4,000 people annually including nearly 1,800 children. In the past year, the organization provided nearly 200,000 days and nights of shelter and support. All of Shelter Network's programs are designed to help families and individuals break the cycle of homelessness, permanently. In fact, in the past year nearly 90% of families and single adults completing our programs successfully transitioned back into homes of their own.

Shelter Network's Maple Street Shelter is both a short-term emergency shelter and a mid-term transitional housing program for homeless adults. The 76 bed center which opened in 1998 provides shelter and comprehensive support services including meals, case management, housing and vocational placement assistance as well as medical services and substance abuse and mental health counseling to people for up to 6 months. Those served come from all over San Mateo County and many are considered "difficult to serve" because in addition to homelessness, they are struggling with other complex issues including substance, mental or other illness and/or are veterans besieged with disabilities including Post Traumatic Stress Syndrome (PTSD). In the past year, more than 550 people found shelter and support at the Maple Street Shelter and impressively, after an average of 103 days, 80% of those who completed the transitional program succeeded in securing permanent housing again.

**Timeline:** Shelter Network’s Maple Street Shelter is a fully operational emergency and transitional housing program which is open and staffed 24 hours per day 7 days per week.

**Goals and Anticipated Outcomes:**

<b>Maple Street Shelter Program Goal:</b> The Maple Street Shelter Program will provide emergency shelter and transitional housing as well as comprehensive support services to homeless adults so that they can stabilize, find jobs and return to permanent homes of their own.
Outcome #1 In FY2011, Shelter Network of San Mateo County will <b>maintain programs and staffing</b> at the Maple Street Shelter at full capacity.
Outcome #2: In FY2011, the Maple Street Shelter will provide the community with a minimum of 28,000 <b>days and nights of shelter</b> and support for homeless adults .
Outcome #3: By the end of FY2011, a minimum of <b>80%</b> of those completing the Maple Street Shelter’s Transitional Housing program <b>will secure permanent housing.</b>

**Proposed Use of Federal Appropriation Funds:**

If granted, Shelter Network of San Mateo County would utilize the requested funds for the following:

1. To re-hire 2 positions (1 Case Manager and 1 Shelter Worker) which were recently cut due to decreased funding from both public and private sources.
2. To maintain essential shelter services and case management as well shelter staffing at full capacity
3. To provide meals and maintain vocational training, job and housing placement as well mental health and substance abuse support services at their full level.

**How will this project request serve to expand the capacity of your organization and how will your organization sustain this work beyond the federal funding?** *(Your response must focus on the impact of the requested funds rather than the organization’s long-term goals.)*

This appropriation funding would help in two important ways. 1) It would enable Shelter Network, during these difficult economic times when we are seeing significant decreases in funding from our public and private sources and an unprecedented demand for services, to re-instate key positions at the Maple Street Shelter so that it can effectively meet and respond to the tremendous need of the homeless in our community. 2) The appropriation funding would help to ensure that the Maple Street Shelter’s essential and impactful services are maintained at full capacity for all those that need them in the next year and so that homeless adults – many of whom who are finding themselves on the streets for the first time, can stabilize, find jobs and return to homes of their own. Beyond the requested funds, these services and positions would be sustained through increased funding from our public and private partners. We recently invested in our future by hiring a new and highly experienced Director of Development to lead our fundraising efforts. The new Director, who was homeless himself over 20 years ago, has a tremendous passion for our mission and is already preparing a plan which will help to ensure that we can maintain and even, enhance and expand Shelter Network’s services. .

- The Maple Street Shelter is one of only two shelters that provide emergency shelter and transitional housing in San Mateo County
- The Maple Street Shelter is full to capacity with over 76 people accessing shelter and support services daily
- Shelter Network of San Mateo County and the Maple Street Shelter are currently experiencing an unprecedented demand for services.
- In the year ahead, nearly 600 people including approximately 300 residents of California's 12<sup>th</sup> Congressional District, will access shelter and support at the Maple Street Shelter
- 80% of those completed the Maple Street Shelter's Transitional Program will secure permanent housing

**How many residents of the 12<sup>th</sup> CD will benefit from this project? (i.e. jobs created, services rendered to, how many people, etc.)**

If granted the requested Federal appropriation funds at the level request, we project the following benefits..

- 2 Full Time Positions (1 Case Manager and 1 Shelter Worker that have been vacant due to budget shortfalls will be re-instated and filled.
- A minimum of 300 clients (50% of total served) will benefit from receiving shelter and comprehensive services at the Maple Street Shelter
- 80% of the residents of the 12<sup>th</sup> Congressional District who complete the Maple Street Shelter's Transitional Program will secure permanent housing

The above items are in addition to the fact that as a result of this funding, the over 600,000 resident's of California's 12<sup>th</sup> Congressional District would derive comfort from knowing that if they should ever find themselves homeless and in need of support, Shelter Network's Maple Street Shelter would be there fully staffed and able to help them.


